Activity Week reports

Colwyn MM0YCJ

My September CPSARC Activity Week was an absolute beezer. I was on holiday rock climbing in a place called

Squamish near Vancouver, Beautiful British Columbia in Canada. A late summer climbing trip and I had taken along a couple of radios to try to include some Canadian SOTA activations.

On Saturday 6th September we had just arrived in Vancouver and had stayed close to the airport in the city. After a very early breakfast, helped by the jet lag, we drove to a nearby SOTA summit; VE7/GV-009, Burnaby Mountain in the Greater Vancouver area (370m, Latitude: 49.2792, Longitude: -122.9086, QTH Locator: CN89ng).

It is a drive-on summit atop a university campus (Simon Fraser University) and there is a play-park next to a concrete water tower where I was able to set up an end fed half-wave trapped wire for 20/40 metres strung between some trees in the park.

First I tried 2 metres and was rewarded with an FM mobile QSO with a motorist nearby (VE7JBX/M). Being in British Columbia I had the prefix VE7, hence my callsign was the lengthy VE7/M0YCJ/P. I was using my FT-4X with the Yaesu commercial antenna and the US calling channel is 146.520MHz, which I found also works for Canada.

This immediate early success was not sustained and I shortly moved to use my FT817 (5 watts) and the EFHW antenna. On 20 metres WA7JTM came back to my CQ call down in Phoenix, Arizona; 1976Km away and the furthest QSO of the day. There were no other takers on 20 metres although I could hear many station and I assume it was just that they couldn't hear me!

I moved back to the FT-4X on VHF and spoke with VE7MXL some 22Kms away, then with N1ELS who was also a SOTA station on W7W/NO-035 (Elk Mountain) in Washington State, USA across the border 164Km away. I then discovered he was with three other SOTA people; KK7ULL, KK7UKE and KC7EPG, so seven QSOs in total with 4

Summit-2-summit contacts. This took about an hour in total and as we had to go shopping to buy some climbing

boots for the holiday, so 7 QSOs would have to suffice. My first Greater Vancouver activation, a success with a short walk back to the hire car.

Sunday 7th September we explored Vancouver but on Monday 8th we headed up to Grouse Mountain, a small ski resort area just north of the city. A ski lift takes you from around 300 metres up to over 1000 metres and various summer attractions.

From there we walked past a small electrified enclosure with two tame grizzly bears (photo 1) and headed for Goat Mountain a few kilometres away on a well marked, but

consistently rough track.

The summit of Goat Mountain (SOTA reference VE7/GV-010, 1401m, Latitude: 49.4036, Longitude: -123.0789, QTH

Locator: CN89lj) had a few small trees to rig up the FT817 (5 watts) and the lengthy EFHW antenna.

First I gave a shout on 14MHz and got 3 QSOs, W7BCM, KV7DX, KF7JQV being at an altitude of 400 metres and at a weekend helped. The fourth was a VHF British Columbia operator (146.520MHz) callsign VE7URL.


Switching back to 14MHz I got a 8236Km transatlantic contact with Chris (F4WBN) in southern France, not a bad QSO working QRP; 4.7 watts as measured by John on a CPSARC radio test night! There were three summit to summit contacts; A US SOTA operator (AC1Z/VE7) on Partridge Hills on the south of Vancouver Island (VE7/CL-020, Latitude: 48.5553, Longitude: -123.485, QTH Locator: CN88gn) this was a VHF contact 98Km away.

A short iscussion ensued about whether the British Columbia identifier (VE7) should be added as a prefix or a suffix?

Subsequently I have found that for CEPT operators – such as those from the UK – we should use VE7 as a prefix, but for USA radio hams their bi-lateral agreement requires the use of a suffix.

Then there were three 14MHz contacts, callsigns KX0R, 1789Km away on W0C/SP-074 (Burntop, 3379m, Latitude: 39.19, Longitude: -105.5832, QTH ocator: DM79fe), K6YK in California (1283Km) and K6EL on another summit 1280Km away on W6/NC-298 (Vollmer Peak, Northern Coastal Ranges, California, Latitude: 37.8834, Longitude: -122.2218, QTH Locator: CM87vv).

A total of 9 QSOs from a super summit (Photo 2).

Next day on Tuesday 9th September we drove up to a second ski resort serving Vancouver; Cypress resort. The

SOTA summit is called Black Mountain (VE7/GV-013, 1224m, Latitude: 49.3944, Longitude: -123.2186, QTH Locator: CN89jj) and has a well marked and busy footpath through dense forest and up to the rocky summit.

A quick shout on VHF (146.520MHz) got contact with a special station VE7MIR (Vancouver mid-island radio club) on Nanoose Hill (VE7/NO-020, 254m, Latitude: 49.275, Longitude: -124.1588, QTH Locator: CN79wg). It was a radio club outing and I was able to log QSOs with four other club members; VA7TLS, VE7JFZ, VA7KGW and VA7AJN. With the FT817 I then got a couple of 14MHz QSOs with WB6POT (1161Km, San Jose, locator CM99mb) and K6YK in California 1283Km). Only 7 QSOs but another super summit.

Next day on Wednesday 10th we returned to Cypress resort and hiked up to the summit of Hollyburn Mountain

(VE7/GV-011, 1326m, Latitude: 49.4006, Longitude: -123.1831, QTH Locator: CN89jj). We flogged up a bare ski run for most of the height followed by a rough track to another rocky summit with plenty of space for a the EFHW trapped for 20m/40m (Photo 3). Again VHF produced three QSOs; VE7MLZ, VE7PMD and mobile station, VE7EFK/M.

Switching to 14MHz I was rewarded with three QSOs, two in France; F5PYI and Chris again F4WBN. There was also WB6POT in San Jose.

So an enjoyable activity week while away on a climbing holiday in Canada (Photo climbing). The hills are generally tough to climb and the number of radio operators was not large, but success came with a bit of patience and good operating practice.

Activity week I was on every day and made a total of 105 QSO's. See the breakdown tables below.

20M was 44%, 40M was 35%, 7% was 10Mhz, 7% was 15Mhz and 1% on 28MHz where I made the QSOs. This month decided to do just DATA. I also gave GM2T/P some points and multipliers in the RSGB SSB Field Day, Data modes all hard work with the bands I think in a terrible state (I must admit they were at the times I operated). Maybe next month it will be better.

- Log Checking
 - o The log was checked for mistypes and general logging mistakes before it was finally submitted. It can be quite amazing the difference of doing these checks before submission on how much your actual score can change. Sometimes it goes in the negative i.e. we lose points but often it goes in the positive and we gain points, the bottom line it is well worth doing. The log entry is in my opinion one of the main important aspects of any contest. It is why you took part and that is to submit the best score you possibly can.... Strange as how many contesters dismiss the checking off their logs!
- We have ended up with more points after checking so we can now see how it all checked out and where we ended up in the contest. Personally, I am really pleased with the effort this year so well done to everyone who took part.
